Who we are...

Momentum Developmental Support

While Momentum is a licensed Home Support Agency, this program has a singular focus on providing community supports to persons with disabilities. Traditional home support programming often focus on elderly care as well as supporting individuals who are medically infirm. Our program's experience in the sector is that care for persons with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (I/DD), or persons with mental health issues, require different skills to perform this necessary work.

Different competencies for workers

Home Support Workers's focus on support for primary care and aging, while Developmental Support Workers for persons with I/DD focus on building independence, skill development and community integration.

Need to Understand Dual Diagnosis

Clients with I/DD present with co-occurring mental illness (i.e. psychosis, depression) to a greater degree than the general population; support staff for these individuals need to be able to recognize mental disorders and how to provide support in the moment.



Service Coordination

Residential care for persons with I/DD requires service coordination at the residence level; we provide home managers who oversee the frontline staff, day-to-day care of our clients, as well as ensure the support workers adhere to the competencies for their field.

Professional supports

Momentum has a host of supports in providing residential care including property management, professional HR managers, accounting supports, and professional senior leadership that are leaders in the field of I/DD.

Challenges Facing the Community

Persons with I/DD, and their families, currently face a number of challenges to living successfully in the community.



Lack of Supportive Housing

Supportive housing for persons with I/DD is an ongoing issues with few existing solutions.

Residential Options for Complex Needs

The continuum of care needs new solutions, which should include finding efficiencies within existing systems, for providing care to those with complex needs



Community Integration and Day Programming

Few day program options exist outside of St. John's-Metro, and within the area the waitlists can be challenging. We need more day program options in the province.

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Need for Interdisciplinary Care in the Community

Integrating existing OT, PT, Psychiatry and Behavioral Supports into care options will greatly improve client outcomes.

Need for Greater Supportive Employment Supports

While supportive employment programs exist, more work needs to be done to address the low rate of employment for persons with I/DD.

Need for Alternate Service Delivery

Alternate service providers have a greater innovation capability to adapt their service streams to meet identified needs in the communities and regions in which they operate.





CREATING CAPACITY FOR PERSONS WITH I/DD: A POTENTIAL ARRAY OF CARE

Proposed Solution: Creating Capacity (Community)



Family Support (IIHFS)

Service Coordination that works with individuals and their families (where applicable) to ensure the placement at home remains stable for as long as the individual can safely remain independent or living with family. The primary mandate of the service is to permit persons with I/DD to live at home for as long as possible, and offer service coordination, skill building groups and counseling supports to meet that endeavor.

Clinical Supportive Services

Psychological and behavioral health concerns present at a higher percentage for persons with I/DD then for the general public. Offering counseling services, behavioral health coordination, occupational therapy and other services to support clients with I/DD in their daily lives in the community would prevent placement breakdown in the remainder of the array of services..

Day Program

Structured day programs are a great way to support individuals with I/DD and reduce the demand for respite care services. The program's aim is to provide instruction in line with the individuals ability and interest, while offering a challenging, safe and fun environment with activities that engage the individual. While the St. John's-Metro area have some programming options available, waitlists can be lengthy and there are currently no day program options outside the St. John's-Metro area.
